Other names: Sam gone away, Sammy's gone away

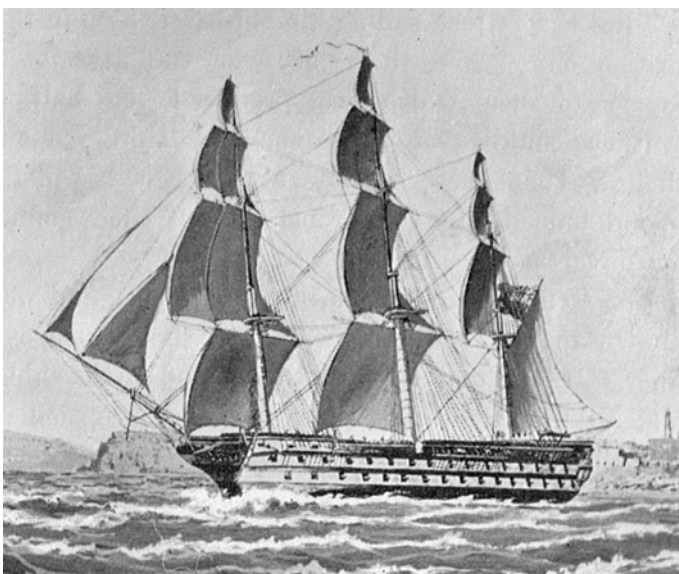
The job of the shantyman to supply enough verses for the job in hand is particularly easy in this song as a man o' war could have 700 or so crew.

The [Exmouth Shantymen](#) wrote:

This is a traditional song sung by Barouallie whalers from St Vincent on the [Windward Islands](#).

... **Edgar Mulrairie**, a Barouallie whaler, ... first heard it in the 1940's when he began whaling as a young man. His father had been a harpooner and one of the first whalers in Barrouallie. Mulrairie found the work hard, and sometimes dangerous. His experiences included long hot days rowing, severe squalls, and having the boat stove in by a sperm whale.
